HISTORIES: paintings and drawings by GLENN SUJO

Glenn Sujo was born and raised in South America and studied in the USA and in this country where he now lives. This exhibition is a pictorial exploration of his origins, taking themes which are both autobiographical, as in the family portraits and paintings recalling childhood experiences; and historical, reconstructing events of voyage, discovery and conquest in the New World. Inspired by the art of the past and seeking continuity with earlier cultural traditions, Sujo makes the human element and an essential optimism central to his work.

URBAN KISSES: Seven artists from New York

Presenting paintings, drawings, sculptures and photographs from seven of New York's most dynamic young artists — John Ahearne, Mike Glier, Ken Goodman, Keith Haring, Robert Longo, Judy Rifka and Cindy Sherman — this exhibition treads a narrow, but electric, path between the celebratory and the sinister. The work is characterised by imagery that is figurative, narrative, large scale and media-based, and reflects an interaction between cultural and subcultural activities, such as the graffiti of the subways and ghettoes and the music of the streets. ALTERATIONS and THE ROVA SAXOPHONE QUARTET

Steve Beresford, Peter Cusack, Terry Day and David Toop, all respected musicians in their own right, come together as Alterations to perform free improvised music on a variety of instruments and unusual soundsources. They are joined by the American Rova Saxophone Quartet, Jon Raskin, Larry Ochs, Bruce Ackley and Andrew Voight, all of whom have jazz backgrounds and have been individually involved in free improvisation. As the Rova Saxophone Quartet they perform "structured improvisation" — using carefully worked out compositions as a base for solos balancing their music between jazz and new music. £2. / £1. claimants

MICHAEL NYMAN BAND Michael Nyman is one of the trio of English Experimental composers, (John White and Gavin Bryars appeared at the Bluecoat last season) who achieved a minor cult following in the mid-seventies largely due to Brian Eno's Obscure label. Nyman has moved into the eighties with his own band which has taken the hypnotic overlaying qualities of seventies 'systems' music fashioned a new louder and more agressive style of music which retains the earlier structural motifs. £2. / £1. claimants Part of the Regional Contemporary Music Circuit

L'ECOLE D'ORPHEE leader John Holloway

L'Ecole d'Orphée was founded in 1976 by John Holloway to perform 17th and 18th century chamber music with the instruments and techniques of the period. Since then the ensemble has performed extensively in Europe and at the major English Festivals, has an impressive list of BBC radio broadcasts and is currently recording all the instrumental chamber music of Handel for CRD. The programme includes works by Handel, Vivaldi, Telemann and Bach.

REASON Philomel was formed in London in 1980 to explore the wide variey of 18th and 19th century music for their unique combination of baroque flute, recorder, natural horn, viola da gamba, lirone, theorbo, harpsichord and voices, and has received considerable praise for its versatility and programming of unusual and entertaining repertoire. Music from the Age of Reason features music from Italy, England, Germany and France including Vivaldi's cantata All 'ombra di sospetto and a selection of music from Handel's first London opera Rinaldo. £2. / £1. claimants
