#### JOHN CARSON: AMERICAN MEDLEY

American Medley is an exploration of romantic and mythical notions about the U.S.A. conjured up by fifty popular songs selected from the 1950's, '60's, and '70's. Having selected the songs and planned the route, John Carson visited each of the fifty towns during 1981/82. At each one he bought the official postcard view and recorded his own impressions on polaroid. The resulting photographic representations (inscribed on the reverse with corresponding lyrics) are presented in pairs and the installation is completed by the inclusion of a jukebox containing the fifty records which inspired the journey, including such gems as Gene Pitney's 24 Hours from Tulsa and Elvis Presley's Viva Las Vegas. A short film on John Carson was shown on BBC 2's ORS 84 in March.

### SIMON PHILLIPS: VIDEO PRESENTATION

### PETER HAGERTY: THE STATE

The State Ballroom in Liverpool city centre is frequented by a young, fashionable clientele. Peter Hagerty's large colour photographs taken at close range were not intended simply to document the venue. They focus as much on the brashness, colour and texture of the subjects' clothes set against the darkened interior as they do on the social activity being engaged in. Peter Hagerty has taken the opportunity provided by the crowded dance floor to observe people in the context of a cramped space. There is no question of the subjects posing for the photographer, what emerges is the sense that his presence was almost unnoticed.

#### April 18-May 26 IVOR ABRAHAMS: THE GARDEN IMAGE

The Garden Image is a fitting exhibition to show at the beginning of Liverpool's International Garden Festival. The garden is a subject which has held a long fascination for Ivor Abrahams and the exhibition, selected from a ten year period, consists of prints (using screen, lithography and etching techniques) and sculptures in steel, latex, and flock fibre.



lvor Abrahams was born in Lancashire in 1935. His work has been widely exhibited and is represented in both public and private collections at home and abroad. Apart from inclusion in the 1976 Peter Moores Body and Soul exhibition at the Walker Art Gallery, Liverpool, Abrahams has not previously shown in his native North-West. This exhibition has been organised in conjunction with Bolton Museum and Art Gallery where it was previously shown.

### PAPER TRAILS: An exhibition of artists working with paper

Paper must rank amongst one of life's most taken-forgranted commodities. Paper Trails is a two-part exhibition which displays the extraordinary versatility of the medium. It includes work that uses paper of any kind (waste, hand-made, machine-made) and encompasses a diversity of approaches from free standing sculpture made from newsprint to reliefs made from paper pulp cast onto textured surfaces; from tissue paper constructions to sculptures made from disused cardboard. The work of twenty-three artists will be exhibited in two separate shows.

#### SCULPTURE IN THE GARDEN

Throughout the period of the International Garden Festival there will be a series of outdoor sculpture exhibitions in the Bluecoat's garden courtyard at the rear of the gallery. The series will look at aspects of contemporary British sculpture, such as the renewed interest in stone and wood and the process of carving, featuring artists for whom the figure is of central concern in their work as well as others working non-figuratively. Also included will be sculptors who have departed from working with traditional materials in favour of adopting and transforming more commonplace and everyday materials and objects.

Up to twenty sculptors will be featured in four separate shows and they include Ivor Abrahams, to coincide with The Garden Image exhibition (28 April-26 May); Christine Angus, Alain Ayers, Keith Brown, Lee Grandjean, Hilary Cartmel, Barbara Rich (21 July-25 August); Eddie Ohren, Dave Brodie, Merilyn Smith, Graham Ashton (1 September-6 October).

## Bluecoat

The Bluecoat is a Grade 1 listed building of architectural importance. It is the oldest building in the city centre, but it isn't simply a monument to times past. It is an active arts centre open to the public six days a week until 10.30pm. The Bluecoat houses a number of cultural societies including Merseyside Arts (051-709 0671). The Workers' Educational Association (051-709 8023) and The Merseyside Film Institute Trust (051-709 4260) and other tenants include The Bluecoat Display Centre (051-709 4014), artists, craftsmen, musicians and many more.

The Bluecoat Society of Arts administers and maintains the building and is directly responsible for the gallery, concert hall, coffee shop and rooms hired out for meetings etc. It has done so since 1927 when the Bluecoat was saved from demolition specifically to promote the arts in this historic and beautiful building.
