Bluecoat

The Bluecoat is a Grade 1 listed building of architectural importance. It is the oldest building in the city centre, but it isn't simply a monument to times past. It is an active arts centre open to the public six days a week until 10.30pm. The Bluecoat houses a number of cultural societies including Merseyside Arts (051-709 0671). The Workers' Educational Association (051-709 8023) and The Merseyside Film Institute Trust (051-709 4260) and other tenants include The Bluecoat Display Centre (051-709 4014), artists, craftsmen, musicians and many more.

The Bluecoat Society of Arts administers and maintains the building and is directly responsible for the gallery, concert hall, coffee shop and rooms hired out for meetings etc. It has done so since 1927 when the Bluecoat was saved from demolition specifically to promote the arts in this historic and beautiful building.

Volunteers

The Bluecoat is always in need of voluntary help. We would like to have two special teams of people, some to help during the day in the gallery and some to help in the evenings at performances.

Gallery helpers are urgently required to invigilate and assist visitors in the gallery. The exhibitions change approximately every four weeks and assistance with the changeover would also be welcome, as would poster distribution. WOOD WORKS: Art and design in wood from Scotland and Northern England


Following the highly successful 1983 Prescote at the Bluecoat exhibition, which presented some of the best new furniture and craft objects by British designer makers, we have again invited Ann Hartree to select an exhibition which she says sets out to show the irrelevance of pigeonholing objects as art, craft or design. The separation is always unhelpful, and in some cases the three are indivisible. On the theme of wood, the show draws together designers and sculptors from Scotland and the North of England. Fine craftsmanship is present in many of the objects and there is a wide spectrum of traditional skills as well as innovatory approaches. I have deliberately chosen the works to show a wide range of surface textures, carved, natural, sanded and polished, stained and laquered, which indicate the versatility of wood as a material and its many uses.

Exhibition organised in conjunction with Highland Craftpoint, Beauly where a version of Wood Works was shown earlier this year. It will travel to the City Art Centre, Edinburgh in January.

CLEMENT McALEER: Paintings and Drawings **PHYLLIS MAHON:** Pastel Drawings VIVIEN BURNSIDE: Figure Works



A prize winner in the John Moores XI exhibition, Clement McAleer has been based on Merseyside since 1979, occupying a studio at the Bluecoat, and he was also included in this year's John Moores exhibition. His new show consists of recent paintings as well as pastel drawings completed over the past year, and this new medium has introduced greater spontaneity and fresher colour into the work whilst still reflecting the artist's interest in viewing the landscape in different ways.

. . . I like the idea of opening out onto sweeping panoramas, moving from the single fixed viewpoint to a sense of the all-round. Clement has chosen two other artists, for whom the human figure is central in their work, to exhibit alongside him.



Phyllis Mahon's large pastel drawings, with their bold portrayal of men and women, suggest thoughts and emotions between the figures depicted, heightened more recently by their integration into complex environments of water and vegetation. Vivien Burnside is making an installation specifically for one of the gallery rooms, consisting of irregular shapped drawings collectively titled Figure Works. Drawn in a variety of materials including bitumen, wax and commercial paints, these works aim to relate directly to the viewer in terms of their size and situations, and like Phyllis Mahon's drawings, convey a strong sense of relationship between figures.

KEITH TIPPETT

Whether in solo improvisation, small intimate groups or the fifty strong orchestra Centipede Tippett's music is infused with his own original and expressive piano style. Tonight he plays solo piano and if the moment is right we may catch a glimpse of the sensitivity and pure magic that is all too rarely heard.

NEW YORK JAZZ

Scottish drummer **Billy Kyle** has lived and played in the bustling New York jazz scene and has brought to Britain the top-class talent he found there. **Mitch Stein, Charley Knicely, Tim Ouimette** and **Todd Anderson** on guitar, bass, trumpet and sax make up this sizzling quintet, who are bound to leave our ears ringing for days!

Friday 25th October at 7.30pm

THE PAT CRUMLEY SEXTET

Third World Sketches is the title of a six-part work inspired by the music, politics and culture of Africa, Latin America and the Middle East. From the famine of Africa to the land-gift scheme of India, the music will lament and celebrate the Third World, and looks finally to an optimistic future. This distinguished group consists of Guy Barker (tmpt), Peter Saberton (pno), Dave Green (bs), Simon Moreton (perc), Trevor Tomkins (drms) and Crumley on saxes and flute, and their combination should prove to be exciting and moving.

Wednesday 20th November at 7.30pm

THE GARY BOYLE BAND

A well known figure in Liverpool, **Gary Boyle** has teamed up with **John Etheridge** (gtr), long time accompanist to Stephan Grappelli, **Dill Katz** (bs) and **Nic France** (drms) to form an electric based band. All four have very varied backgrounds and you can be sure that this evening will be a raucous and exhilarating event.

Friday 29th November at 7.30pm

HOWARD RILEY — FACETS

To end the season we have a very special event bringing together the very best of British new jazz. Riley will place himself in three different situations: solo—trio—quartet. His solo piano will set the scene after which he will be joined by the bass and drums of **Jeff Clyne** and **Tony Levin**, who will involve themselves in a re-examination of the work of **Thelonious Monk**. After the

interval a quartet of Riley, **Evan Parker** (sax), **Barry Guy** (bass) and **John Stevens** (drums) will give an improvised set which cannot fail to stun, surprise and delight. Book early to avoid disappointment.

Thursday 31st October at 7.30pm

ELECTRONIC MUSIC NOW

The use of computers is now an accepted part of modern music and this group demonstrates how computers are putting the new technology to use in a creative and new way. Presenting works by Nigel Osborne, Denis Smalley, Marco Stroppa, Jean-Claude Risset and Tim Souster and using the biggest electro-acoustic sound system yet toured in this country, the music is an example of the diverse and imaginative use of new electronic systems in music today.

Sunday 10th November at 7.30pm

GEMINI — NEW MUSIC ENSEMBLE

This is the opening concert of a year-long residency in Merseyside by this new music ensemble. They will be based in different areas of the county for each of their autumn, spring and summer terms. During these periods they will be teaching, coaching and performing in schools, community centres and concert venues. The main aim of the project is to inspire people to make their own music from what resources they have, i.e. from rock band to school choir to amateur orchestra. The project was instigated by the Bluecoat and Merseyside Arts and is a collaboration between these organisations and the local Education Authorities in Merseyside.

Thursday 14th November at 7.30pm

3PVD plus THE BURN/BUTCHER DUO

An evening of free improvisation with these two groups who draw their vocabulary from both contemporary classical music (Stockhausen, Cage, etc) and avant garde jazz. Saxophonist **John Butcher** and multi instrumentalist **Chris Burn** have worked together for ten years in one form or another and with this collaboration they have evolved their own personal language to produce an ever changing aural landscape. In contrast to the acoustic approach of Burn and Butcher, **3PVD** (**Phil Durrant, Parny Wallace and Paul Hession**) use electric violins, saxophones and drums to create a more layered, denser sound. All have toured extensively in this country and throughout Europe to much acclaim.





On the door: ticket sales commence half an hour before the advertised start of performance.

Concessionary prices (claimants): apply to students, pensioners, under 16s and the unemployed.

Bluecoat Friends: 10% discount on tickets bought in advance. Please note that you must produce your membership card and that this discount does **not** apply to tickets bought on the evening of performance.

LATECOMERS

Latecomers may not be admitted until a suitable break in the performance. This must be strictly observed in a small auditorium as any interruption disturbs both the audience and the performers.
