**WORKING IMAGES** involving members of the LIVERPOOL ARTISTS WORKSHOP

A deep mistrust of certain artistic practices, fuelled by occasional media sensation stories, results in a widespread loss of value in art. The artistic community's lack of action to rectify this is symptomatic of two things. Firstly, the fact that the powerful agents of officialdom (bureaucracies, funding bodies, etc.) are too easily able to regulate certain aspects of our culture; and secondly, the reluctance of artists to work 'on the front line' illustrating and combatting some of these oppressive and contradictory forces at work. The continuation of these mutually enforcing factors has allowed the unnecessary myths of art to flourish; for instance, the 'artist in his garrett' creating for creation's sake, and the image of art as an elitist activity outside of common experience.

The LIVERPOOL ARTISTS WORKSHOP, since its beginnings in 1980, has realised through its programme of events a concern for making their art accessible and free from these myths. This means having to confront many people's conception of what art's function is. The enormous space, with all of its obstacles, between the living-room wall and the gallery wall is primarily a problem of understanding. The WORKING IMAGES exhibition attempts to cross that space by combining a school workshop programme and an adult education lecture series, entitled 'Social Themes in Art' (held in conjunction with the W.E.A.), as part of the process in eliciting a greater awareness of the form and function of art today. Through all of these events the relationship of the production of art to the 'World out there' is stressed. # ROBERT SODEN and IAN HAMILTON FINLAY

FEAR AS ARCHITECT — Paintings by Robert Soden

In Robert Soden's watercolours, the observed landscape or architecture of a particular place he has lived in or visited, is subverted by the juxtaposition of sinister elements symbolising the nuclear age: Durham Cathedral's windows take on the shape of missiles, Polaris lurks off an idyllic Dorset coast and a Cruise-laden train hurtles through the English countryside.

As a result of several visits to Italy, Soden began combining in his paintings an interest in architecture with a narrative content, and ancient Roman monuments became silos for modern armaments.

His fascination with the 'sad beauty of urban decay and the excitement generated by the spectacular dynamics of contemporary buildings' have resulted in paintings which present a nightmare vision of a disposable society—vehicles career out of control from multi-storey car parks and supermarket trolleys protrude from stagnant ponds.

#### LIBERTY, TERROR & VIRTUE: lan Hamilton Finlay

The renowned Scottish artist Ian Hamilton Finlay first came to prominence in the early 1960's through his work with concrete poetry. Impatient of attempts to categorise him simply as an artist, poet or sculptor, Finlay now often works in collaboration with other artists or craftsmen. Since 1967 he and his wife have devoted themselves to the creation of one of the most unique and beautiful works of art in the country — the garden at Little Sparta, the Finlay's home in Lanarkshire. Here the Finlay's have created a living landscape, full of elegant and telling echoes of artists and philosophers of the past, fulfilling Finlay's intention of linking past cultures to our own. The Bluecoat exhibition, on tour from Southampton Art Gallery, consists of three sections: The Third Reich Revisited series of drawings and stone reliefs, a satirical and provocative look at bureaucracy and contemporary art; a slide display tracing the history of gardens created by artists, including Little Sparta; and a section of 'official war art' from the now famous Little Spartan War, Finlay's much publicised dispute with Strathclyde Regional Council.


