The sequence's title, Korabra, 'means to the Akan people of Ghana 'to go and come back. It is also the signal drum played at funerals. The word implies a journey, the longing to return home, and the spirit questing after its fulfilment. For Jantjes the journey is as much a search for a painterly language capable of



Beginning with a series of woodcuts about the German revolutionary Rosa Luxemburg, brutally murdered by army officers in 1919, McKinlay's work over the past year army officers in 1919, Michiniay's work over the past year has undergone a radical shift in emphasis. A world in conflict (Die Schlacht) is now the central concern as images of popular protest, political struggles and social unrest abroad and at home: Orgreave, Brixton, Belfast, Greenham and Wapping — images familiar from TV screen or newspaper — become the subjects of a proliferation of paintings and prints.

The folk music of Hungary has always exerted a profound influence on the music of Hungarian composers. The most famous instrument associated with the music is the cimbalom. One of Hungary's leading composers, György Kurtag, has written extensively for this instrument, as well as specifically for his distinguished compatriot, the soprano Adrienne Csengery. Kurtag's output is not extensive and, as a result, his reputation has spread slowly, but major exposure at recent Bath and Cheltenham music festivals, and with the London Sinfonietta, has established him as one of the most important composers living today.





COUNTRY was conceived in order to draw attention to the plight of a lot of people in the Midwest who are living through a depression as bad as the one that inspired The **Grapes of Wrath**, but seemingly forgotten by the rest of the nation. The personal experiences of "the hottest couple in Hollywood" give the film an extra dimension and true depth of feeling.



#### October 9 (Thurs) **GOIN' SOUTH** DIRECTOR: JACK NICHOLSON Jack Nicholson Mary Steenburgen

Rescued from the gallows by a rather prim lady who is in need of an unpaid hired hand, the future looks like a fate worse than death to the ex-horse thief. But he gets caught up in her struggle just as we do in this infectiously enjoyable Western. Nicholson not only plays the unshaven, failed outlaw but also directs with great flair.

#### October 10 (Fri) JOHNNY DANGEROUSLY DIRECTOR: AMY HECKERLING Michael Keaton Peter Boyle Marilu Henner

A very funny spoof of Thirties gangster movies. No cliche is forgotten, no stereotype left undemolished. As well as Cagney, it is obvious that Mel Brooks was an inspiration the laughs are raucous, rude and quite, quite relentless.

Teenage dreams and frustrations are at the core of this strange, by now cult, movie. It is not just another teen/ youth/bike exploitation flic. Coppola is above that and so are his two leading actors, whose real breakthrough film this was.

The real-life Colonel Redl, former Commander of the Austrian 8th Army and head of the Vienna military intelligence department, committed suicide on May 25th, 1913. Nicholson plays a new member of the Border Patrol Guard who moves into the El Paso area of the American/ Mexican border. While his wife sets about making a dream house of garish consumer goods he becomes enmeshed in the corruption of his colleagues and the misery of life across the Rio Grande.

#### October 31 (Fri) BIRDY **DIRECTOR: ALAN PARKER** Matthew Modine Nicholas Cage

Birdy, so called due to his life-long obsession with birds, resides in a military hospital after his experiences in Vietnam. He is now convinced that he actually is a bird. His childhood buddy is brought in to try and help him out of his traumatised state. A moving, intelligent film of rare dramatic quality.



### November 3/4/5 (Mon/Tues/Wed) KISS OF THE SPIDER WOMAN DIRECTOR: HECTOR BABENCO William Hurt Raul Julia

The scene is a cell in a Latin American jail. Its two occupants could not be more different — one is a macho, revolutionary idealist, the other a homosexual who yearns to be a woman. William Hurt gives an outstanding performance as the latter and was rewarded with an unprecedented trio of awards from Cannes and both British and American academies. Unmissable.

The complex development of the relationship between a mother and daughter over the course of thirty years is explored with humour and tears. Five Oscars including Best Film and one for Jack who just seems to be himself. That's star quality.

#### November 7 (Fri) THE CRAZY FAMILY DIRECTOR: SOGO ISHII Katsuya Kobayashi Mitsuko Baisho

Is the Japanese sense of humour funny? If we say THE CRAZY FAMILY is a black comedy of Japanese family life, we mean BLACK. It is a subversive mixture of satire and slapstick which gleefully attacks bourgeois hypocrisy and paternalism. You have certainly seen nothing like it.

#### November 10/11 (Mon/Tues) CRIMES OF PASSION DIRECTOR: KEN RUSSELL Kathleen Turner Anthony Perkins

The thin line between fantasy and reality, especially concerning sex, is the film's main theme. Kathleen Turner is a successful fashion designer whose night time alter ego is an equally expert prostitute. #### November 12 (Wed) **COP AU VIN DIRECTOR: CLAUDE CHABROL** Jean Poiret Stephane Audran

The setting is a French small town whose rural quiet and charmingly picturesque facades conceal seething passions, an army of crazed neurotics and bloody murder. A splendid comedy-thriller which thankfully shows Chabrol to be back on top form.

#### November 13/14 (Thurs/Fri) PRIZZI'S HONOUR **DIRECTOR: JOHN HUSTON** Jack Nicholson Kathleen Turner

The Prizzi family is a Mafia family. Their honour is their word as bond — whether to pay or slay. However, John Huston, at nearly 80, is playing mainly for laughs, with the enthusiasm of a film school graduate and the assurance of a master. The characters manage simultaneously to be bestially evil and largely lovable none more so than Nicholson as the loyallest, if not the brightest, of the family retainers.

#### November 17/18 (Mon/Tues) **FALLING IN LOVE DIRECTOR: ULU GROSBARD** Robert De Niro Meryl Streep

They **do** still make pictures like they used to. The best screen actor and actress around team up for a love story that could be Brief Encounter re-written for the Eighties.

#### November 19 (Wed) **ANNE DEVLIN DIRECTOR: PAT MURPHY** Brid Brennan Bosco Hogan

Based on the contemporary journals of Anne Devlin, remembered historically as the housekeeper of Republican leader Robert Emmet, this is the first feature to be entirely financed, cast, crewed and shot in Ireland. It is a penetrating insight into the position of women in the history of Ireland.

#### November 20 (Thurs) DETECTIVE **DIRECTOR: JEAN-LUC GODARD** Nathalie Baye Claude Brasseur Johnny Hallyday Jean-Pierre Leaud

In a Paris hotel room William Prospero is trying to solve a mystery: two years earlier, in the same room, a man named Le Prince was murdered by an intruder and Prospero was dismissed after fifteen years as the hotel detective. Godard's latest film is a thriller — of sorts. He still shows no sign of compromise.

#### November 21 (Fri) **STREETWISE DIRECTOR: MARTIN BELL**

An eye-popping, mind-numbing documentary, made on the streets of Seattle, detailing the self destructive lifestyles of a generation's young losers.

In a prologue, eight chapters and an epilogue, this film constructs a spiritual biography of Armenian poet Arutium Sayadian (1712-95). Though, on the surface, this obviously means little or nothing to most of us, in fact THE COLOUR OF POMEGRANATES is a work of genius. A true masterpiece.

#### December 1/2 (Mon/Tues) JAGGED EDGE DIRECTOR: RICHARD MARQUAND Jeff Bridges Glen Close

A San Francisco newspaper editor charged with the brutal murder of his wife. Did he do it or not? **JAGGED** EDGE is that old chestnut — the courtroom drama. But such a superb example as this has not been seen for many years. Irresistible.



#### December 3 (Wed) W.R. MYSTERIES OF THE ORGANISM **DIRECTOR: DUSAN MAKAVEJEV** Milena Dravic Jagoda Kaloper

**Tuli Kupferberg** World Revolution or Wilhelm Reich? Makavejev's notorious film seems to advocate both. An alarming mixture of surreal fiction, propaganda and documentary about Reich's sexual theories for a liberated society. Some social commentary (?) is provided by one of The Fugs!
