

Founded in 1982, this young male contemporary company has achieved a remarkable degree of national recognition. Phoenix were the subject of a Thames TV's South Bank Show in October 1984. They have already earned the reputation of being one of the most exciting and original young companies to

The group's strong interest in non-Western music can be heard in the extraordinary range of instruments played from cello, trombone, sax, vocals & guitar to bouzouki, shakuhachi, khene, and electronics!



Friday 21 February at 8.00pm Mark Springer, ex-pianist with the sadly missed **Rip**, **Rig and Panic**, plays a rare solo concert tonight. His hybrid style, a mixture of Keith Jarrett, Cecil Taylor and Mrs. Mills, ranges from the manic tinklings of the early Rip, Rig days to the subtle and elegant improvised chord structures found on his solo album *Piano*. Recently dubbed by the I.C.A. as 'one to watch in '86' Springer will show us what they mean.

Lol Coxhill

Thursday 27 February at 8.00pm Lol Coxhill is one of the finest saxophonists in this country. The wide variety of musical styles he has been involved in from free improvisation to mainstream jazz, from session work to film scores, show credit to his versatility. He has recently been the subject of a one hour film commissioned by the Arts Council of Great Britain which will be shown prior to the performance. Lol last appeared at the Bluecoat at the sell out concert of **Trevor Watts Moiré Music** in January 1985.

Tony Oxley and Didier Levallet

Anglo French Double Quartet Tuesday 11 March at 7.30pm The Oxley/Levallet group is a powerful example of the current collaborations between European musicians — an ensemble featuring resourceful soloists, veering from orthodox tonality and structure to periods of free association, from the outer reaches of improvisation to the relaxed, lazy swing of an old style jazz orchestra, all held together by the bass and percussion duo of Didier Levallet and Tony Oxley, two of Europe's foremost rhythmic practitioners in conventional jazz and beyond it. Guitarist Derek Bailey is a leading figure in the

cliche free, his tonal manipulations always at the
service of the music. Bailey first worked with the Dutch
drummer and percussionist Han Bennink in the early
70's. Currently Bailey's fascination with totally free
improvisation has led to the establishment of
Company, an international pool of musicians such as
Evan Parker, Steve Beresford, Anthony Braxton,
Steve Lacy, Paul Rutherford and Lol Coxhill who play
together without forming a permanent group.

Extempore String Ensemble and Danserye

Friday 21 March at 7.30pm The Court and Theatre in Early Baroque England & Spain. English music from Dowland to Purcell and Spanish music by Marin, Guerrau, Sanz and others played on contemporary 17th century local instruments with dancers of the period in full costume. These players bring an exciting feel of improvisation and rhythmic vitality to this early dance music — made all the more so accompanying the adept and accomplished dancers.
