installation at the Oratory, St James' Cemetry "Spelling out antiquity, an immeasurable sadness overwhelms me as I think of that age of magnificent and charming beauty passed beyond recall, of that world quite vibrant, quite radiant, so coloured and so pure, so simple and so varied" (Gustave Flaubert). Holly Warburton transforms the interior of The Oratory, a neo-classical building in the shadow of the Anglican Cathedral, with a tape-slide event that captures the spirit of Flaubert's words. A myriad of images enclose the

viewer in an impossibly sensual world drawn from such diverse sources as Keats, Baudelaire, neo-classical sculpture, and the Parthenon. The soundtrack to this visual feast quotes Wagner and Strauss, Prince and the Eurythmics.

This project is part of TSWA 3D, the most ambitious public art event ever staged in Britain. Twelve artists transform nine sites from Glasgow to Dartmoor. During the week October 5-11, 1987, London's Riverside Studios will host Britain's largest, most established performance festival, the National Review Of Live Art. Recently the Parley of Instruments has recreated the first ever Renaissance Violin Consort, using instruments that are constructed, strung and set up very differently from the familiar baroque strings, and which in consequence give rise to a strikingly more gutsy and raw sound. The programme offers a survey of the violin family's repertory during the first century of its existence. It ends with Farina's amusing programmatic Capriccio Stravagante, a work by a collegue of Monteverdi that is appropriately posed between the Renaissance violin consort tradition and the new style of Baroque virtuoso solo music. The Parley of Instruments takes its name from some of the earliest public concerts in the world, given in London in 1676 by the violinist John Bannister. The Parley has toured all over Britain and appeared in France, Holland and West Germany, recording for Radio France, Radio Hilversum and WDR Cologne. They have also made over thirty broadcasts for the BBC.

This programme precedes the new work by music from two composers who have arguably been the greatest influences on 20th century music and is followed by pieces which have attempted to extend the resources of the instrument, Peter O'Hagan studied at Cambridge University and the Guildhall School of Music and later privately with Peter Katin and Kendall Taylor.

Since his London debut at the Wigmore Hall in 1977 he has given frequent recitals in London and the provinces with appearances at the Harrogate, Nottingham, Crosby and Bath Festivals. Recent tours abroad have taken him to Spain and Germany, where he made his concerto debut with the Frankfurt Radio Orchestra. He has established a particular reputation in the contemporary repertoire, and in 1985 gave two successful critically acclaimed programme of works by Messiaen and Stockhausen.

STRAIGHTTHROUGH THE HEART DIRECTOR: DORIS DORRIE Beate Jensen Sepp Bierbichler

Now justifiably acclaimed for **Men**, this is the German Ms. Dorrie's debut feature of two years earlier previously unseen in this country. It is the bizarre tale of Anna Blume who meets Dr. Armin Thal at a house auction. He offers her a salary of 2000 D.M. a month, free board and lodgings in his house, no obligations and certainly no emotional ties. She accepts for 2500 D.M. but, the arrangement soon begins to go disastrously wrong.

April 10 (Fri) MURPHY'S ROMANCE DIRECTOR: MARTIN RITT James Garner Sally Field

Veteran radical director Ritt presents us with a gentle, ruminative celebration of small town, rural America. The prolonged courtship of Murphy Jones and the newly arrived divorcee, Emma, provides basic plot line with Garner and Field simply perfect in their roles.

April 13/14 (Mon/Tues) THE OFFICIAL VERSION DIRECTOR: LUIS PUENZO

Norma Aleandro Hector Alterio This intelligent and accomplished Argentinian film deals with the painful subject of the "desaparecidos"—the

with the paintul subject of the desuparectass — the people who disappeared without trace in the bad years. The issue is approached through the experience of a wellto-do couple who are initially quite uninvolved. Outstanding performance and confident direction deliver the message in the form of a powerful human story.

April 15 (Wed) STARDUST MEMORIES DIRECTOR: WOODY ALLEN Woody Allen Charlotte Rampling

Woody Allen plays Sandy Bates, a successful comedy director, who wants to make serious pictures. In this most autobiographical film Allen draws upon Fellini's **B**¹/₂ as well as the expected Bergman references. Smart oneliners and visual gags enhance a script which is basically of serious intention and probably the most "difficult" he has attempted.



April 16 (Thurs) KING KONG'S FIST DIRECTOR: HEINER STADLER Leonhard Lansink Werner Grassmann

Another local premiere, and West German debut. Stadlet gives us a satisfying, modern-day story which revolves around cinema history and indulges our love of old Hollywood. It is no coincidence that Wim Wenders stars in one of the lesser roles — echoes of his own **Kings Of The Road** abound.

April 22 (Wed)

A MIDSUMMER NIGHT'S SEX COMEDY

DIRECTOR: WOODY ALLEN Woody Allen Mia Farrow Jose Ferrer Mary Steenburgen Tony Roberts

The setting is turn-of-the-century upper New York State three couples assemble for a June weekend at a country house. The inspiration is part Bergman's **Smiles Of A Summer Night**, part Shakespeare. The result is pure Allen magic. A warm, pastoral film full of whimsical good humour.

April 23 (Thurs) PEPPERMINT FREEDOM DIRECTOR: MARIANNE ROSENBAUM Saskia Tyroller Peter Fonda

The story of a young girl growing up in a remote Bavarian village at the end of the last war. The liberating forces bring promise of peace and freedom, but instead the world is plunged into a Cold War. Six year old Marianne worships a G.I. who seems to be dispensing more than chewing gum. She tries to make sense of the mysterious adult world and the film successfully reconstructs the fragmented, surreal way in which children view things.



April 24 (Fri) PARTING GLANCES DIRECTOR: BILL SHERWOOD Richard Ganovng John Bolger Steve Buscemi

Though set in an almost entirely gay milieu, homosexuality is not presented as an issue, Robert and Michael have been together for years. The choice for them is not heterosexuality, but other lovers; Robert is being posted abroad and Michael's best friend, Nick, is dying from AIDS. **PARTING GLANCES** depends on making us care about these three characters. It succeeds gracefully and with a lightness of heart that we might not have expected.

April 27/28/29 (Mon/Tues/Wed) SID AND NANCY DIRECTOR: ALEX COX Gary Oldman Chloe Webb David Hayman Andrew Schofield

This is the story of Sid Vicious and his girlfriend Nancy Spungen. The original title **Love Kills** should perhaps have been retained; the uncompromising final part of the film is a better anti-drug advert than any government propaganda. There is no preaching or cheap pointscoring. Gary Oldman is simply great as Sid and Alex "Repo-Man" Cox is already becoming almost legendary himself.



April 30 (Thurs) ZELIG DIRECTOR: WOODY ALLEN Woody Allen Mia Farrow

A movie structured like a present-day TV documentary looking back at a bygone era with the help of newsreel, stock shots etc. The eponymous hero of this "documentary" is blessed with the talent to be everyone else. He involuntarily turns fat in the company of obese people, a brown shirt when visiting Hitler's Germany. **ZELIG** is like no other film before it. Woody Allen, comedy's gifted chameleon, has pulled it off yet again." (David Castell—Daily Telearaph)

May 1 (Fri) DUST DIRECTOR: MARION HANSEL Jane Birkin Trevor Howard

J. M. Coetzee's **In The Heart Of The Country** is the basis of **DUST**. The interior monologue by the daughter of a Cape Province farmer, alone on the veldt except for the old man and his black servants, has been opened out by Ms. Hansel into a carefully paced, beautifully shot film that succeeds in expressing Coetzee's horror at the woman's degradation and despair. Jane Birkin's performance is a revelation.



May 5/6 (Tues/Wed) A ROOM WITH A VIEW DIRECTOR: JAMES IVORY Helena Bonham Carter Daniel Day Lewis Julian Sands Maggie Smith Denholm Elliot Rosemary Leach Judi Dench Simon Callow

This exquisite version of E. M. Forster's novel, directed with exuberance, style and grace, captures both the comedy of manners and the underlying sadness of characters caught in a period of burgeoning social upheaval.

May 7 (Thurs) BROADWAY DANNY ROSE DIRECTOR: WOODY ALLEN Woody Allen Mia Farrow

The film is one of those anecdotes of adversity that variety performers circulate to cheer themselves up. Woody Allen is Danny Rose, a hugely unsuccessful theatrical agent, a New York showbiz "character", whose story is recreated in flashback from the reminiscences over lunch of a group of vaudeville comedians. Danny's clients included a girl who played wine glasses, a blind xylophone player, a one-armed juggler...

May 8 (Fri) SUGARBABY DIRECTOR: PERCY ADLON Marianne Sagebrecht Eisi Gulp

A plump, lonely undertaker's assistant falls in love with a tube train driver whose voice she has heard over the P.A. system. Her obsessive love and she-devilish cunning lure him away from his wife. In the process she transforms herself from dowdy and overweight to sensual and volupt-uously fat. **SUGARBABY** is a funny, surreal fantasy generously endowed with humour.

May 11/12 (Mon/Tues)

DIRECTOR: DORIS DORRIE Heiner Lauterbach Ulrike Kriener

Having discovered that his wife is having an affair Julius moves out and, under an assumed name, rents the attic over her lover's apartment. His plans are complicated, however, as the two men become firm friends, sprawling nightly before the TV in a sea of beer cans and fast food. **MEN**, says Ms. Dorrie, is the result of a scrupulous ethnographic survey! If a "German comedy" seems inherently antithetical it is time to cast off such prejudices. One of the funniest, and most successful, films ever to come from West Germany.

May 13 (Wed) THE PURPLE ROSE OF CAIRO DIRECTOR: WOODY ALLEN Mia Farrow Jeff Daniels

Allen disappears behind the camera and, as if to compensate, the leading man in the heroine's favourite film casually strolls off the screen to become her flesh and blood companion. As they pursue a chaste love affair the rest of the on-screen cast wait helplessly. "A comic fairy tale of classic, genial simplicity."

In a house by a lake, four men are preparing a meal while talking incessantly about sex. In a gymnasium, four women toil at their physical improvement and also talk about their sexual experiences. When the women join the men for dinner the conversation ranges over history, politics, the Pope's prostate—and, inevitably returns to sex. - reconstruction of the film theatre, with the envisaged conversion to two screens, an attractive foyer and a box office, and new projection facilities approximately £120,000
- improvements and extensions to the Coffee Shop and the Gallery **approximately £45,000**

The cost of this will be £250,000.
