

Throughout July the Display Centre shows the work of schools and colleges on Merseyside, from primary to degree level, in a variety of media. 'Salvador Dali arrives in Liverpool this year – what will he see?' The answer to this question and probably quite a few others will be provided by the winning entries in the **Display Centre Schools Crafts Competition**; divided into two age groups, 5-15 and 16+, the works employ a wide variety of craft-orientated materials, and the show is being organised to celebrate the opening of the Tate Gallery, Liverpool.

If you prefer to spot your own winners, then the selection of work from the **Merseyside Colleges' degree and diploma shows** should prove of interest. This is your opportunity to pick up a bargain from the ceramics, jewellery, fashion, textiles and weaving on display.

Weaving will also feature in an exhibition organised jointly with Sue Lewis, selected from work produced in the recent weaving workshops that took place in a number of Liverpool inner city schools.

September 6 – 24 sees the Society of Wood Engravers' retrospective 50th exhibition "Engraving Then and Now". This exhibition is a comprehensive representation of the membership of the Society throughout its 50 years' history and includes over 150 exhibits. As the title suggests, the exhibition shows an historical progression of the society, from the 'heroic Age' of the 20's and 30's, through its slow decline and eventual fading out in 1976, to the reforming of the society in 1984. The enduring popularity of the medium is probably best explained by Fitz Eichenberg: 'the wood cutting process itself is utterly simple, it requires no press, no large work space, no expensive tools, no chemistry, no fancy equipment' The magical appeal of wood engraving is that from such utterly simple means, so complex and patient an art may be produced.





second-wave sculptures & installations by STEVE JOHNSON JOHN PLOWMAN **NICOLE POLONSKY ANDREW ROBARTS**

The second of our sculpture exhibitions being staged over the summer as a complement to Tate Gallery, Liverpool's Starlit Waters, focuses on the work of four artists. Each works in quite disparate and distinctive ways, but they nevertheless share a similar approach to materials and the way in which the seemingly mundane can be manipulated and transformed with unexpected results.

Nicole Polonksy trained as a printmaker, but has extended the medium beyond its conventions by exploring a range of untypical forms, often incorporated into installations using mass produced objects. Her new work involving the arrangement of hundreds of wedding cake decorations investigates the stereotypical nature of the marriage institution.

John Plowman seeks to locate a classical notion of culture in relation to the present day by combining drawings and objects, juxtaposing images from classical Greece - columns, details from freizes, statues - with symbols denoting modern values, like supermarket trolleys and consumer goods.

Steve Johnson's' work is concerned with images of transition. A threatened object with the threat exorcised. An object of burden without burden ... ' The immediacy of his sculptures belies the complex processes involved in their making and the layers of meaning revealed.


Extending beyond the gallery, Andrew Robarts is making an installation in the Bluecoat front courtyard, using images from the building's past, made in concrete and steel-materials of the present. Like fossils, these sculptures 'record objects rather than represent them ... becoming a history rather than a commentary, a monument rather than an event'

Further afield, at Canning Place billboard site, John Plowman's temporary installation HIS: Story – a sculpture to walk around, painted on the reverse of the hoardings, 'addresses the question of what lies behind the images of this present that advertising re-presents to the culture'.

But live, Joolz injects a passion that brings them vividly to life. Joolz does not create, she reproduces violently and as a stand up comedienne she knows all the tricks.

Having completed more than 300 appearances all over the UK together with regular contributions to local and national newspapers, radio and magazines, not forgetting booklets, tapes and live LPs, **Henry Normal** is probably one of the most well known poets that you've never heard of ... until now.



The third summer sculpture exhibition features two artists in the forefront of new British sculpture. **Andy Goldsworthy** has emerged from a recent tradition of landscape-based art, as an artist who in fresh and exciting ways stimulates an awareness of the beauty and texture of our natural surroundings. These 'on site' investigations are mostly temporary and are documented by photographs, though he has also made large permanent sculptures in Grizedale Forest, Cumbria and in Dorset, and has been commissioned to work in Park and Japan. He is only one of five British artists invited to show in the Aperto Section of this year's Venice Biennale.

Vincent Woropay's enigmatic sculptures, made using traditional methods like stone carving and bronze casting, draw on classical forms to pose questions about our knowledge of the past and the present. Many of his earlier sculptures were concerned with architectural form and space; more recent work has combined architectural allusions with references to the human body, and has displayed a strong preoccupation with fragmentation and ruin. He has often explored effects of *trompe l'oeil* and of perspectival distortion. Woropay has completed two large-scale sculptures recently, in Bristol and Birmingham and will be working on a proposal for the Bluecoat front courtyard.

M.I.H. Celebrates

As part of its 60th Anniversary celebrations, Merseyside Improved Housing has commissioned five artists to make artworks for its housing schemes. A small display documenting the project will be at the Bluecoat, consisting of work by **Penny Somerville** (stained glass), **Alan Lloyd Jones** (ceramics), **Nigel Prince** (stone carving), **Rob Williams** (photos) and **Gill Hopley** (murals). **Nigel Prince** will also be exhibiting new sculptures in the Garden Courtyard during the show.

The projections set out to illuminate the hidden implications of public myths at the very sites where they are celebrated. 1988 work will centre on the destruction of the social fabric of our cities.

The Bluecoat is collaborating with Artangel Trust on this project, which takes in the Edinburgh Festival, Manchester and Birmingham as well as Liverpool, where a prominent public statue is likely to be the focus for an evening projection. 
