


NEW ART MERSEYSIDE Till 13 May

ZVUKI MU

Zvuki Mu's single, produced by Brian Eno and released on his Land/Opel label, looks destined to be cult record of the year. Their sound has been compared to early Talking Heads, Captain Beefheart and Joy Division.

Zvuki Mu first came into contact with Brian Eno when founder bass player Sasha Lipnitsky and other Russian musicians conversed via satellite with Eno, Peter Gabriel and various Western musicians in the spirit and humour that he offered to be in the spirit and

The New York Times wrote, "Leader, Peter Manonov, is one of the most captivating showmen in the USSR. When he sings, his entire elastic physique contorts into compositions of anguish, confusion and ecstasy". At Peter's side, Sasha Lipnitsky who on leaving school decided to be a journalist/political observer until he lost "all illusions about our country". Maybe its this quality that distinguishes Zvuki Mu from other Moscow bands who in the words of Lipnitsky, "all sooner or later take up the rules of the local game". Instead of politics Lipnitsky took to writing about pop/art culture and is proud of being one of the first writers to publish in "Soviet Culture" a positive appraisal of Sergei Kuriokhin's work. Of Eno he says, "I am glad to have contact with Brian Eno because he is almost the only representative of Western rock culture whose work is still interesting to me". Of Russia he says, "I think that Zvuki Mu, like all the Soviet people, have sad





prospects. Our physical and moral health is coming to an end. It is hard to stand the misfortunes of socialism but we cannot leave our country for eyer. That is why we will suffer and pray to God to help us."

In this, their first visit to England, Zvuki Mu are playing three dates: London's ICA, the Bluecoat and the Glasgow Mayfest. An event not to be missed. Moscow's Art/ Pop Culture at its best.

The Cookie Crew are England's most successful girl rap team. Lifelona friends Debbie (aka M C Remdee) and Susie (Susie Q) first became aware of hip hop and rap in the early 80s. They cite US innovators Afrika Bambaataa and Grandmaster Flash as well as rap movies such as Beat Street and Rap Style as early influences. It was in the latter they saw one of the first ever all female rap groups, the US Girls. Seeing them competing with their male counterparts was a great encouragement and they started experimenting with their own rhymes as early as 1982, when it was unusual for English kids, especially girls, to get on the Mic.

1989 sees the Cookie Crew with two top ten singles under their belt. Their debut LP Feelin' Proud is due for release in the near future. Girls in control, prepare for the invasion.

DOGS IN HONEY

Present SONS OF BITUMEN Friday26 May 8pm Tickets £3.00/(£2.50) Sons of Bitumen is the fourth production from Nottinghambased Dogs in Honey. It is the work of four men - Stephen Jones, Graham Wrench, Philip Hughes and Huw Chadbourn under the direction of one woman, Sarah Tutt.

The show, which received rave reviews after their recent ICA performance, is a piece of visual theatre that dissolves self imposed stereotypes of male language and actions beyond the bounds of the 80s.





MFIT German Season

RAINER WERNER FASSBINDER-GERMAN ANGST

Fassbinder was born in 1946. The forty three films he directed before his early death in 1982 were products of a convoluted game of emotions between him and a close knit group of versatile actors, many of whom were part of the so called anti theatre founded by Fassbinder in 1968. His first was Love is Colder than Death in 1969, but it was not until 1974 that he received international acclaim and recognition when Fear Eats the Soul shared the Critics Prize at Cannes.

The Marriage of Maria Braun, Lola and Veronika Voss were the first three films in a proposed series in which Fassbinder intended to trace in microcosm the development of German society, and especially the German bourgeoisie, since the last war. Fassbinder's entire oeuvre is unusually rich, varied and fascinating, but even by his own exacting standards these late films stand out as exceptional.
