The pioneering photomontage work of German artist John Heartfield is seen in this exhibition from the Werkbund-Archiv Berlin, arranged in association with the Goethe-Institut Manchester, Born Helmut Herzfeld in 1891, he analicised his name in 1916 in protest at the anti-British campaign in Germany. A member of Berlin Dada, he went on to work almost exclusively with photomontage, using it as a weapon against the growing tide of Nazism. Magazine illustrations, bookiackets, puppets and other material comprise this exhibition which is complemented by a selection of recent photomontages which illustrate Heartfield's continuing influence and the potential of the technique for artists working today. Exhibitors include Graham **Budgett, Peter Dunn and** Lorgine Leeson, David Evans, Colin Fallows, Jamie Reid, Bill Sharp, South Atlantic Souvenirs, Klaus Staeck, Cath Tate, Krzysztof Wodiczko and Peter Kennard whose work is featured in a 35 minute video tape Photomontage Today by Chris Rodrigues and Rod Stoneman.

Talks on Photomontage

John Willett, the distinguished Brecht scholar and authority on Germany between the wars knew Heartfield personally and talks about his life and work.

Co-author of Photomontage: a political weapon, David Evans is currently writing a new study on Heartfield. Here he discusses photomontage since Heartfield, especially since 1948
