The Mystic Revealers emerged in the mid 80s in Jamaica. inspired by the mystical belief of the Rastafari faith. Under the guidance of songwriter/lead vacalist Billy Mystic Wilmot. The Revealers in the last few years have become the most outstanding new band on the Jamaican music scene, and have been received enthusiastically by press and audiences alike. Their songs have been covered by such notables as the 1 Threes and Jimmy Cliff. This is their first tour of Britain.

With the release in March of his second LP on the Bluenote label, Tommy Smith is rapidly catching the imagination of the press: "Tommy Smith has already transcended the stylistic boundaries of conventional jazz" (The Guardian)... "it's the quality which attracts you to the playing" (The List)... "remarkable, controlled and tempered" (Down Beat), This talented young saxophonist, still in his early 20s, is joined by Jason Rebello (piano), lan Froman (drums) and Terje Gewelt (bass).

Following their sell out performance at the Bluecoat in Autumn, we ore pleased to welcome back Joleo Flamenco from Seville, Spain. Flamenco is a very old art form, but is one that continues to evolve. Today it has reached a peak of sophistication, as artists with highly developed techniques continue to break new ground. Jaleo, formed in Seville by five young performers, are at the forefront of this latest development. Their outstanding reputation has grown out of unique and varied performances in which emphasis is placed on spontaneous improvisation between singers, doncers and auitarists.

Trip City, the debut novel by Trevor Miller, hailed by some as the voice of a generation, is an apocalyptic nightmare vision of the acid house summer of love, 1988. Trip City is 254 pages of short sentences, with virtually no commas, which is meant to mirror the 4/4 beat of house music. Hence the musical presence of A Guy Called Gerald whose sound track on cassette is available with the book in a beautifully packaged special edition. Trip City goes where even our beloved tabloids fear to tread, plunging deep into the horrific excesses of big city party life and taking a swipe at the young high powered class that both promotes and revels in it. Life in Trip City is a broken bottle and the hero of the book Valentine lacerates himself on it again and again.


