

paintings, installations and video by Palestinian artist Bashir Makhoul who has lived in Britain for five years, and first exhibited at the Bluecoat in 1990 whilst a student at Liverpool Polytechnic, His earlier paintings used classical Arab patterns and the limited colours of the Palestinian flag to express, within the framework of hard edged abstraction. his political concerns and conflicts. Recent paintings continue this exploration through further complex geometric configurations and the use of calligraphy, emblems and strong colour arrangements. Although the presence of classical Arabic patterns culturally positions his work between Middle-Eastern and Western traditions, his use of them transcends cultural boundaries. In a new installation, entitled Change, Makhoul uses clay pots - the basic domestic utensil found in markets and homes throughout the Middle East and coins which are enlarged copies of the old coinage of the

Islamic Empire, to express the plight of his people in the international political arena. The work is also a melancholy statement of an artist in exile.

Organised in collaboration with Huddersfield Art Gallery, the exhibition is accompanied by a full colour illustrated catalogue with texts by Gordon Hon and John Hyatt. Price £4.50

A CRITICAL DIFFERENCE

Contemporary Art from India

the work of eight artists from the Indian sub-continent, some of them exhibiting for the first time in the West. As exhibition organiser David Thorp writes in the catalogue, the intention "is to show contemporary art from India as far as possible on the artists' terms without reducing it to the fulfilment of a colourful and exotic preconception that usually accompanies Western notions of what is interesting about Asian culture". Vivan Sundaram, N N Rimzon and Ravinder Reddy draw on iconic and narrative aspects of India's great sculptural traditions, to create sculptures that differ markedly from one another yet have a shared formal inventiveness and poetic power. Engaging with current debates surrounding issues of gender and sexuality, Bhupen Khakhar, Nalini Malani, Gogi Saroj Pal and Madhvi Parekh integrate various elements of folk art and mythology into their paintings. In contrast, V K Wankhede's collages are abstract, resulting from a process of painting over layers of different fabrics. In dealing with questions of representation, narrative and form, all these artists refer, some more directly than others, to traditional art or craft. It is perhaps this factor which forms the 'critical difference' which creates a modernism that is clearly distinct from its European counterpart.

BILL MING

Two Rock Passage to Liverpool


Bill Ming is holder of the first Liverpool John Moores University Sculpture Fellowship. Funded by The Henry Moore Foundation, the Fellowship is for a sculptor whose work is rooted in a non-Eurocentric perspective. Born in Bermuda. Ming has lived in England since 1971 and his work draws on a rich cultural heritage. His experiences in Bermuda, as a merchant seaman, and as an artist in Britain form the threads of recurring personal themes which balance the public and social concerns evident in much of his sculpture. The work in this exhibition - using the garden courtyard as well as the gallery - comprises wood carvings, drawings and mixed media works made over the past year in response to working in Liverpool: "I have tried to reflect the nature and history of Liverpool as a

maritime port and meeting place of culture. The Black community of Liverpool, which is the oldest in Europe, has played a central role in that market place, as traders. labourers and, chillingly, as commodities. The Fellowship has enabled me to explore their experience, sometimes turning the very tools of oppression into symbols of solidarity, and also to explore more universal symbols of journey, growth and creativity. The most important of these in my current work is the vessel, which is both positive and negative shape, shelter and prison, and a means of spiritual travel."

The exhibition will be accompanied by a selection of paintings and sculptures by a group of locally based artists whose work, like Ming's, reflects a diversity of experiences and responses to living in Liverpool. Exhibiting artists include: Paul Clarkson and Karl Eversley, both from the recently established studio at The Gallery in Sandon Street, Daniel Manyika and Leonora Walker.


