We are at an exciting stage of the Bluecoat development, the framework for the new wing has been erected and the first floor has been constructed. The layout of the performance space and the new galleries are now clearly recognisable, allowing the curatorial team to stand in the space and visualise our future exhibitions and events there.

In the previous gallery the partition walls have been removed to create a spacious reception area for visitors and tenants which will make access to Bluecoat efficient and friendly.

ACCESSING BLUECOAT



New win

The development project aims to improve accessibility to Bluecoat. We have gone beyond the requirements of the Disability Discrimination Act and building regulations to create both an accessible physical environment and a philosophical approach to accessibility.

Previously the building was difficult to access with over 27 different levels and no lifts. The design of two new vertical circulation cores within the east and west wings of the building rationalise these levels to make this 18th century building as accessible as possible. Our inclusive design has resulted in door widths being increased, lift access, disabled toilets, baby change facilities and safe evacuation in a lift on a separate power supply.

Bluecoat is also improving access by working with groups of deaf and disabled adults and young people in its Wayfinding project.

The new Bluecoat will be a place for everyone to visit and enjoy.

WAYFINDING PROJECT

DaDaFest exhibition

Between May and September 2006 groups of deaf and disabled adults and young people took part in the Wayfinding project, working with artists to investigate access in imaginative ways. They were asked to make recommendations to Bluecoat as to how the venue can be as accessible as possible when it reopens. The recommendations cover a huge range of issues including marketing, staff training, programming, signage and information. Bluecoat staff are now looking at how to implement the suggestions.

Bluecoat tried out some of the recommendations during DadaFest when an exhibition of work by deaf and disabled participants of Bluecoat's Connect programme was shown at Out of the Bluecoat. To complement the exhibition we produced large versions of text and images, an audio guide, a DVD of a British Sign Language tour given by a deaf artist along with tactile and high visibility signage. All our volunteers attended a basic training session in deaf and disabled awareness. The feedback from visitors was very positive and gave us a clearer idea of what might work within an exhibition environment.

In Different Places, Shanghai

e-space lab is an artists' initiative whose ongoing link between Liverpool and its Chinese twin city of Shanghai uses technology to build up a visual dialogue and a space for ideas between people in the two cities. Last November saw the launch of a video-making exchange involving architecture students from Liverpool John Moores University and Shanghai University, initiated by e-space lab's Xu Zhifeng.

In Different Places gives you an opportunity to continue this communication using video streaming which enables you to see what is happening in the different cities in real time. A transnational dialogue will also be launched, initiated by the Philosophy in Pubs group, in the context of what in Shanghai is called an 'English corner' – a place where people gather to discuss ideas and practice their spoken English.

The project will end in the summer with a city centre exhibition and a local presence around European Good Neighbours Day at the end of May.


