The annual Bloomberg New Contemporaries 2016 touring exhibition has returned to Bluecoat for the first time in 30 years. This year's selection of artists emerging from UK art schools has been chosen by guest selectors Anya Gallaccio, Alan Kane and **Haroon Mirza**. The exhibition brings together 46 artists working across a range of media such as painting and drawing, digital image manipulation, animation and animatronics.

Liverpool Biennial 2016 Dennis McNulty: Homo Gestalt

Dennis McNulty's Homo Gestalt is composed of multiple intercommunicating parts including an installation at Bluecoat and an iPhone app. Audiences are moved through overlapping physical, temporal and virtual realms, reflecting our contemporary experience.

McNulty's reference points include Theodore Sturgeon's novel More Than Human which describes a scenario where multiple people 'BLESH' (mixing 'blend' and 'mesh') through telepathy to act as a single organism or 'Homo Gestalt', and Stafford Beer's 1970s Cybersyn project. Cybersyn pre-empted the Internet, and was intended to process the productivity and happiness levels of the Chilean population in the context of Salvador Allende's socialist government.

Keith Piper: Unearthing the Banker's Bones

Renowned British artist Keith Piper's new solo exhibition premieres a major new three-channel video installation, Unearthing the Banker's Bones, which addresses contemporary concerns about race and class through the perspective of a fictional future.

Piper adopts this science fiction device of looking back on the present from the eyes of our descendants to imagine the excavation and dissection of modern life. While weaving his own narrative of social and economic collapse, he draws on extracts of apocalyptic fiction by writers including Octavia Butler and Mary Shelley.

These themes are echoed in Robot Bodies, Piper's 1988 interactive digital work updated and re-programme for this exhibition - in which the robot, android and cyborg are examined as metaphorical carriers of contemporary anxieties around racial difference.

The show is completed by a series of newly commissioned mixed media works on un-stretched canvas, 'future projected history paintings of the present', that reference 19th century history painting.

This exhibition, organised in partnership with Iniva (Institute of International Visual Arts), continues Bluecoat's long-term relationship with Piper, begun three decades ago with Black Skin Bluecoat and including Trophies of Empire. The show continues into 2017, marking the start of Bluecoat's 300th anniversary year.

The new work, *Unearthing the Banker's Bones* (2016), is a 70th anniversary commission for the Arts Council Collection with Bluecoat and Iniva.

Inspired by Keith Piper and Adham Faramawy's exhibitions and their own research, University of Liverpool PhD candidate Beata Gubacsi and Iniva programme coordinator Laura Castagnini select extracts from Butler's ground breaking science fiction novels and short stories.



Adham Faramawy: Janus Collapse (the juice-box edition)

Adham Faramawy is a Dubai born, London based artist of Egyptian origin whose practice spans moving image, sculptural installation and print. He uses technology to examine how identity is constructed in the 21st century. The body is central to his practice and is depicted as a sensual site in which gender and sexuality are fluid. In the making of his work Faramawy often draws on the language of advertising, co-opting the special effects used to evoke desire for people, things and experiences. The artist combines these seductive devices of brilliance, slipperiness and repetition with the transgressive aesthetics of 'body horror' found in David Cronenberg's cult classic Videodrome (1983) and Octavia Butler's Xenogenesis science fiction trilogy.

INTRODUCTION

Welcome to autumn at Bluecoat.

Our autumn season celebrates Bluecoat's long-term commitment to diversity, showcasing a wide variety of voices and perspectives both from Britain and overseas.

October brings the arrival of **Keith Piper's** new exhibition *Unearthing* the Banker's Bones. The exhibition sees Piper return to Bluecoat having previously exhibited here as a young artist 30 years ago, in Young Contemporaries. This annual exhibition, which set out to showcase emerging talent from British art schools, later went on to become Bloomberg New Contemporaries. Our connection with the exhibition continues, with the 2016 edition of the exhibition currently showing in our galleries until 16 October.

After Young Contemporaries, Bluecoat went on to work with Piper at key stages in his career: first in the exhibition Black Skin, Bluecoat in 1985, and again in Trophies of Empire in 1992.

In Unearthing the Banker's Bones Piper uses the science fiction device of a future perspective to cast light on our current concerns. Since uncertainty and unpredictability have come to dominate public life in Britain at present Piper's investigations on video and canvas promise to be relevant and thought-provoking.

Artist Adham Faramawy, who is London-based and of Egyptian origin, comes to Bluecoat this autumn with his exhibition Janus Collapse (the juice-box edition) at an exciting moment in his career. Faramawy, another New Contemporaries alumnus, is specifically interested in how identity is affected and shaped by twenty-first-century technologies and advertising. It will be interesting to see how our audiences respond to his vibrant artworks in which bodily fluidity is a key motif and sciencefiction again an influence.

Our long-running **Blue Room** project invites adults with learning disabilities to take part in a range of different arts activities. In Collaboration, with the help of artist **Dave Evans**, we celebrate the work of our project *Out of* the Blue, in which Blue Room members, supported by our participation team, deliver after-school arts clubs and holiday activities for children across Liverpool. An inclusive approach is also a feature of our Auto Agents exhibition which has been curated by a group of five people with learning disabilities, facilitated by PhD Candidate at the University of Leeds, Jade French, and working in association with artists from Liverpool's The Royal Standard studio

As part of our plan to strengthen links between the local artistic community and learning-disabled artists, dancer Mary Prestidge has been working closely with Blue Room members as part of INHABIT, our three-year programme of new and improvised dance. Look out for an evening event, Expanding the Picture, which will showcase their work together.

Our events programme reflects both the international and local elements of our focus on diversity. Highlights include Chinese performance artist Yuan Gong's response to Heiner Müller's Hamletmachine, while the new anthology from **Nikesh Shukla** entitled *The Good Immigrant* offers a timely focus on the issue of migration.

We can also look forward to Liverpool artist **Nina Edge** revisiting work from 2006, novelist Tom McCarthy's performance with EVP sessions bound to have an entrancing aura - our annual celebration of author Malcolm Lowry and Bluecoat-based events in the Liverpool Irish Festival. Diverse, wide-ranging, innovative, city-central and yet close to home, we look forward to welcoming you to Bluecoat this autumn.
